

A Good Leader is a Good Servant

Jesus taught us: "You know that the rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their high officials exercise authority over them. Not so with you. Instead, whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first must be your slave — just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." (Matthew 20:25-28)

As you become a leader, you will be one of those working the hardest and serving the most. For a Christian leader, servanthood is a big responsibility, but it is the greatest privilege. By becoming a servant, you are becoming more like our Lord, and He has pledged that He will serve those who serve others for His sake (Luke 12:37).

There are characteristics of a servant:

- A servant leads the greatest servants are the greatest leaders. They model the life of Christ for others and lead people into servanthood.
- A servant does menial tasks a servant does not pick and choose what he will do. He does what needs to be done, even the most menial tasks.
- A servant is faithful God looks for faithfulness in His servant. Faithful means reliable. You can count on the person to carry out the instructions given quickly and thoroughly.
- A servant sees the need he does not need to be told. A good servant takes the initiative and does whatever has to be done.
- A servant is diligent in all of Jesus' teachings and through His own example, He demands that a servant work hard. A good servant does more than he is asked.
- A servant is available when the need arises, the servant is ready to serve. He is prepared to do service at all times.

Be a Proactive Learner


"My son, if you accept my words and store up my commands within you, turning your ear to wisdom and applying your heart to understanding, and if you call out for insight and cry aloud for understanding, and if you look for it as for silver and search for it as for hidden treasure, then you will understand the fear of the LORD and find the knowledge of God." (Proverbs 2:1-5)

There are three types of learners.

- 1. An unresponsive learner this type of person is not open to learn. He thinks that he already knows enough and that no one has much to teach him.
- 2. A passive learner this type of person will learn if taught, but she is waiting for someone else to take the initiative. If no one teaches her, she will not learn.
- 3. A proactive learner this type of person will learn even if no one is teaching him. This person will find someone to teach him because he is hungry to learn.

If you develop an proactive learning spirit, it will bless you for the rest of your life. The moment you stop learning, you will become a grumpy old person.

The Habits of Effective Cell Group Leaders

A survey of cell leaders discovered that there are certain factors that have no affect upon a person's ability to lead a cell group effectively. The following list of non-factors might surprise you: gender, social class, age, marital status, education level, personality type, and spiritual giftings (Reported in *Home Cell Group Explosion* by Joel Comiskey. TOUCH® Publications, 1997).

However, the survey found that there are some crucial factors that directly impact a group leader's ability to lead a group. These include:

- Dreaming of leading a healthy, growing, multiplying group.
- Praying for group members daily.
- Inviting new people to visit the group weekly.
- Contacting group members regularly.
- Preparing for the cell meeting.
- Mentoring an apprentice leader.
- Planning group fellowship activities.
- Being committed to personal growth.

These are discussed in detail in 8 Habits of Effective Small Group Leaders. Anyone who is committed to the Lord, walks with upstanding character, is open to new ways of ministry, and is submitted to the direction of the church, can put these factors into practice.

As you begin leading, you won't practice these habits perfectly. Relax; no one does. You might be surprised at how you are already practicing some of these habits. In the exercise below, rate how much you are putting each habit into practice in your daily life. Don't rate how much you believe in the habit or how much you know about the habit. Rate how much you are effectively practicing the habit.




GROW: I AM COMMITTED TO GROWING AS A LEADER, AND I EXHIBIT THIS BY BEING A PROACTIVE LEARNER.

Facilitating the Group Meeting

The four W's, Welcome, Worship, Word and Works, form an excellent framework to guide you as you facilitate a cell group meeting. Even if your church uses different terms to describe each portion of the meeting, you can use the 4 W's as terms to describe what happens in the flow of a meeting. Rate yourself below on how effective you feel your leadership is in the 4 W's.

Instructions for the Pastor or Cell Leader's Coach

Every person has the potential to lead a cell group. God is no respecter of persons and research has shown that people of all personalities, backgrounds, economic situations, academic training, etc. have led cell groups equally well. If a person loves the Lord, loves people and is committed to the vision of the church, most likely he or she can be trained to be a cell leader.

Obviously, everyone won't become a cell leader. Sometimes it is a matter of timing. Some people don't want to let go of some things in their lives so that they can be free to minister. Others are not open to learning how to minister in new ways. Still, viewing every cell group member as having the potential to lead a group is the first step toward raising up a new leader.

As group members rise to the top and prove faithful in attending group meetings, serving others and reaching out to unbelievers, you will want to visit with that person and talk with them about the possibility of going through cell group leader training. This training will give them the skills to effectively lead a cell group.

Before potential leaders go through your training, you will want to spend some time with them to learn more about them on a personal level. This is where the *Journey Guide for Cell Group Leaders* comes in. Here are three simple steps for using this tool:

- Step 1: Give the *Journey Guide* to the potential cell leader and have him or her fill it out.
- Step 2: Make an appointment to visit with the potential leader about the responses to the questions. It is best to take along the potential leader's current cell leader for this time of sharing.
- Step 3: From the *Journey Guide* discussion, you will help the potential leader take new steps to enter into effective ministry.
